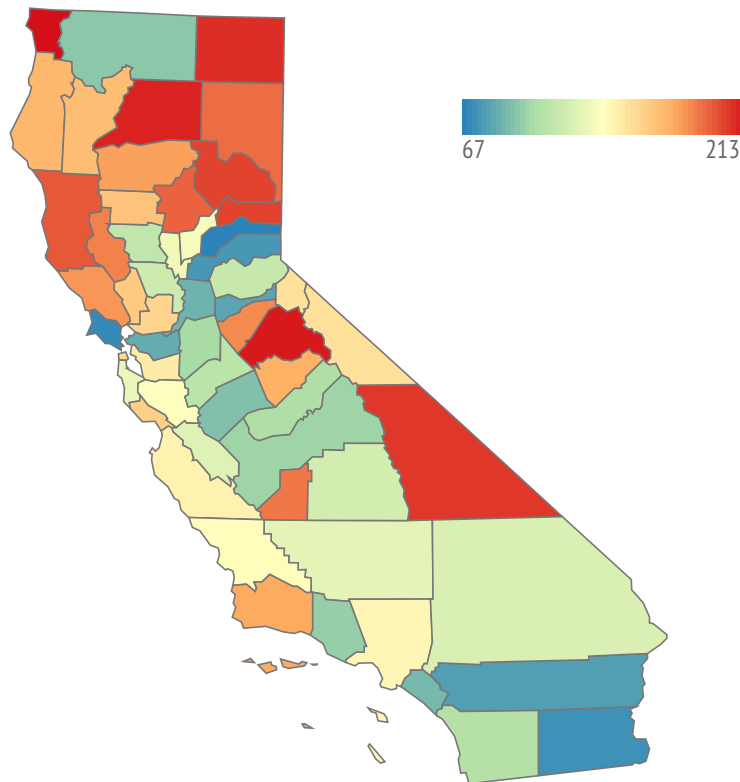




California Women's Well-Being Index Sexual Assault Fact Sheet

The California Women's Well-Being Index provides a comprehensive, composite measure of how women are faring in each of the state's 58 counties. The Index encompasses five "dimensions" – Health, Personal Safety, Employment & Earnings, Economic Security, and Political Empowerment – each of which is made up of six indicators. This fact sheet shows the value and rank for all 58 counties for the Sexual Assault Indicator (see reverse side). Data by race and ethnicity are not available.
